Born – 30 July 1939 at Galveston, Texas.

To USMA – from Galveston, TX. Received a Congressional Appointment. Nickname "Dirty Bill".

Died – 23 December 2022 (age 83) at Miami, FL. Buried at South Florida National Cemetery, Lake Worth, FL.

Military Awards – Air Force Navigator Wings, Air Force Commendation Medal.

Schooling – Atlas "F" ICBM School, Air Force Navigator and Survival School.

Family - Wife – Janet (Carino) Seibel (deceased) – one child (Jamie Leigh) – grandchildren unknown.

Bill served on active duty in the Air Force for 11 years, resigning in 1972, with the rank of Captain and continued to serve in the Air Force Reserve. His first assignments were the Atlas "F" ICBM School and the Strategic Air Command SAC and the Air Force Navigator and Survival School. He then served at McGuire AFB, NJ (Navigator & Senior Instructor, C-135 Transports, 40th Military Airlift Squadron). This included over 50 combat support missions in Vietnam.

After leaving active duty in the Air Force, Bill had a successful career in the manufacture and sale of precision optics. He worked for the Corning Glass Works in Corning, PA (Market Development Engineer, in precision optics, then Senior Process Engineer, then Sales Manager). During this time, he joined the Pennsylvania Air National Guard (Navigator, C-97 Transports) and later (Navigator, C-124 Transports on of Coral Gables, FL). He then had a series of jobs including in Puerto and bought and built his own company. Finally, he worked for Coburn Optical (General Manager, Latin American Operations). Bill passed away on 3 December 2022.

Footnote from Bill - "At the Academy, I excelled in Spanish and demerits (Century Club)". In 60 I met Janet Carino, and she became my incentive to stay off the area during my last 18 months. Our decision to marry upon graduation influenced my decision to go Air Force, a decision I never regretted.....Now (2011), she (Janet) is confined to a wheelchair, and I have the luxury of spending all of my time with her just as we planned it in 1960!"
