Roger served on active duty in the Army (Artillery) for 23 years, retiring in 1984, with the rank of Lt. Colonel. His first assignment was with the 76<sup>th</sup> Artillery, 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division in Germany. He then served at Ft. Knox, KY (Armor Advanced Course), Vietnam (first tour - 17<sup>th</sup> Artillery, 1<sup>st</sup> Cavalry Division), Los Angeles, CA (ROTC Program, University of Southern California), Vietnam (second tour – Military Assistance Command Vietnam, MACV), (212<sup>th</sup> Artillery Group, Ft. Hood, TX (Headquarters, III Corps Artillery), Korea (Field Artillery Liaison), Ft. Hood, TX (Headquarters, III Corps Artillery).

After leaving active duty in the Army, Roger taught Junior ROTC at Marcos de Niza High School in Tempe, AZ for 16 years. He started with 86 cadets and ended up with 255 cadets. Roger passed away on 19 June 2012, from prostate cancer.

Footnote from Roger – "My success in the military and in JROTC is attributed directly to my experience at West Point."

Footnote from classmate – "Roger was a very quiet, conscientious guy who never had a bad word to say about anyone. D-2 had the privilege to get reacquainted with Roger at our 50<sup>th</sup> reunion.
