Dan served on active duty in the Army (Corps of Engineers) for 30 years, retiring in 1991, with the rank of Colonel. His first assignment was with the 8<sup>th</sup> Engineer Battalion. He then served at Urbana-Champaign, IL (University of Illinois), Fort Belvoir, VA (Engineer Advanced Couse), France and Karlsruhe Germany (Company Commander, 83<sup>rd</sup> Engineer Battalion), Vietnam (MACV), West Point, NY (Associate Professor, Math Department), Saudi Arabia (Area Engineer), Fort Hamilton, NY (Facilities Engineer, FE), Fort Leavenworth, KS (Command and General Staff College, CGSC), Korea (Facilities Engineer, FE), Fort Rucker, AL (Facilities Engineer, FE), Carlisle, PA (Army War College, AWC), Germany, (Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff Engineers, HqUSAREUR.

After retiring from active duty in the Army, Dan had a successful career in overseas engineer consulting until his and Pam's return to the U.S. in 1997 and settled in Carlisle, PA. Dan passed away on 30 October 2020.
